#### **6.1 Hautapu Industrial Structure Plan and Plan Change Project Update**

The Chief Executive said an electronic version of the Cambridge Traffic Study, together with a hard copy of the summary, had been provided to Policy Committee members since the last meeting. He said staff are finding out whether any other local authorities have contributed towards Transit New Zealand work on State Highways. He said that information is still being obtained and was not available for inclusion in the July Policy Committee agenda.

Mayor Livingston said he recalled Council had made a commitment to discuss the Traffic Study publicly before confirming its final outcome. The Chief Executive said he would arrange for some traffic engineers to give a presentation on the Cambridge Traffic Study to the next Policy Committee meeting.

#### **6.2 Proposed Waipa District Maungatautari Scenic Reserve Bylaw 2007**

File: 04-03-50

Res: 2/07/71

Group Manager Policy and Strategy, Ross McNeil, said staff have written to Central Government asking for an urgent review of the penalties that apply under the Reserves Act to bring them into line with more recent legislation.

Mr McNeil said there is a mechanism within the existing Reserves Act that allows for a reserve to be declared as a “national reserve” which provides for a penalty of \$1,000 to apply to breaches of bylaws on such reserves. He said staff have asked Central Government to consider that as an interim measure.

Councillor Sharpe said another option would be to lift the reserve status on the two enclosures. Following discussion it was agreed that staff continue to pursue the increase of the penalty with Central Government.

## **7 PROPOSED REFUSE COLLECTION AND DISPOSAL BYLAW 2007 – CONSIDERATION OF SUBMISSIONS**

**Proposed Refuse Collection and Disposal Bylaw 2007 was included in the agenda.**

The Committee was reminded that, in April 2007, it considered the proposal to make the Waipa District Refuse Collection and Disposal Bylaw 2007 and revoke the Waipa District Refuse Removal and Disposal Bylaw 1991. The Committee resolved to notify the proposal to make the Bylaw in accordance with the special consultative procedure and it was released for public comment on 24 April 2007. No submissions were received.

Group Manager Policy and Strategy, Ross McNeil, said Council advised Hamilton City Council that it intends to confirm the proposed Bylaw and the City has responded in support of the Bylaw, as proposed, and advised there are no issues with the use of Hamilton City Council administered roads (e.g. Peacockes Road) for the delivery of waste management services to Waipa residents.

Councillor Lee asked if Council provides for the disposal of hazardous waste. Mr McNeil said there is no Council collection service although it is understood a drop off facility was established at each Transfer Station some time ago. He said there might be an opportunity, through the Regional Waste Advisory Service review, to look at the provision of a shared service and there could also be opportunities when the Waste Minimisation Bill has been through Parliament.

Referring to clauses 5.6 and 6.7 in the proposed Bylaw, Councillor Taranaki asked how Council can ensure the approved refuse containers are removed by the disposer no later than the day after collection, as some of them are still on the roadside several days after the collection day.

Mr McNeil said Council would try to encourage the public to remove the containers from the roadside promptly after the refuse/recycling has been collected. He said any wheelie bins not required after the three-week trial would be removed by Envirowaste. Councillor Taranaki said it would be preferable if all refuse/recycling collectors could collect on the same day.

In answer to a question from Councillor Flay, Mr McNeil said Envirowaste has indicated it will continue to run both services (rubbish bags and wheelie bins) in the short-term. He said it would take a while for the public to become used to the new arrangements and Council would continue to provide information and advice on the issue through the Word on Waipa.

Group Manager Policy and Strategy, Ross McNeil, said Council is required to undertake a review of the four Bylaws relating to the activities and use of public places. He said legal advice received is that the issues covered by the four current Bylaws are still relevant and can be combined into two new Bylaws. These issues include signage, buskers, goods for sale, mobile traders, objects in a public place and skateboards.

Mr McNeil said the Waipa District Public Places Bylaw 2003 was reviewed at a time when two issues were prevalent in the community; namely skateboarding and bicycle riding in public places. At that time it was deemed appropriate to have some controls included in the Bylaw to cover those issues and Mr McNeil said provisions had also been included in the Bylaw to cover the use of footpaths and pedestrian public areas for outside dining. He said no other parts of the Bylaw were reviewed at that time.

In answer to some issues raised by Councillor Lee, Mr McNeil said the control of signage on private property is covered by the District Plan. He said the proposed Waipa District Control of Signs and Sale of Goods in a Public Place Bylaw 2007 would relate to public places such as road reserves, footpaths and other pedestrian areas. He said a permitted activity regime would control the use of signs in those areas; if a sign is outside of those parameters it would require a permit, and any non-complying signage would allow for the enforcement provisions of the proposed Bylaw to be applied.

Mr McNeil said the proposed Control of Signs and Sale of Goods Bylaw only related to public places in urban areas administered by Council as it was these locations where issues were prevalent. The proposed Public Places Bylaw covered the whole District. He said Transit New Zealand (TNZ) has placed a general restriction on signage within road reserves on State Highways but there is an exemption in areas where the speed limit is 50kph or less beyond the kerb line. The applicability of the proposed bylaws beyond these areas was a matter to be raised with TNZ.

Councillor Barnes asked if cars advertised for sale would be addressed under the proposed Bylaws and Mr McNeil said provisions in the Traffic Bylaw prohibit the use of road or road reserve for the sale of vehicles.

Mayor Livingston mentioned some inconsistencies in the proposed Bylaw in relation to where skateboards and bicycles are to be restricted.

[The meeting adjourned at 10.09am and reconvened at 10.33am.]

Mr McNeil said New Zealand Traffic Regulations prohibit the riding of bicycles on footpaths, so that aspect does not need to be covered in the proposed Bylaw. However, he said there is no provision for skateboards in the Traffic Regulations or for the riding of bicycles in areas such as Victoria Square, so the control of those activities has been included in the proposed Bylaw. Mayor Livingston suggested there should be reference to the legislation controlling the use of bicycles on footpaths in the proposed Bylaw to make it clear it is managed by statute.

Committee Members then considered the determination of issues, options and rationale identified in the report for each of the proposed Bylaws and the following was noted during discussion -

- Concern was expressed about the requirement for all mobile traders to obtain a permit. It was suggested that the organisers of “market day” type events should contact Council to obtain a permit, rather than each individual stallholder, although those stallholders selling food would need to deal with Council directly. Following discussion it was agreed to make provision for not-for-profit community market days in the proposed Bylaw.

- Mayor Livingston said it needs to be made clear in the proposed Bylaw that it will be the event organiser's responsibility to obtain the permit.
- Mr McNeil said the proposed Bylaw allows for the payment of a fee for a permit but it is to be at the discretion of the officer.
- It was explained that the control of mobility scooters is included in Land Transport Regulations and there is no need for a reference to be included in the proposed Public Places Bylaw.
- Councillor Barnes asked how signs on the footpath on Lyon Street, Kihikihi can be controlled. Mr McNeil said that was a matter for TNZ and staff would liaise with them during the submission period and report back to the Committee.

The Committee then considered the proposed Bylaws, page by page, and the following was noted during discussion -

- Councillor Jull said there could be some confusion over Alexandra Street (Arawata to Tawhiao Street) being skateboard prohibited because a section of Alexandra Street is a cycle lane. It was noted that Alexandra Street is already skateboard prohibited, under the existing Bylaw, and the Chairperson said the cycle lane is currently under review because of other issues.
- Mayor Livingston said he did not think the proposed Bylaw is treating the prohibition of bicycles on footpaths and skateboards in a consistent manner. He said there is no mention of Kihikihi or Leamington in the First Schedule which is predominantly made up of residential streets in Te Awamutu. Following discussion it was agreed to leave the First Schedule as proposed and see if submissions are received asking for it to be extended to other areas.
- It was agreed to add the word "environs" to Te Awamutu Events Centre and Cambridge Town Hall in the First Schedule to make it clear that the area immediately around both buildings is skateboard prohibited.
- During discussion it was suggested that a number of other areas in Cambridge should be included in the First Schedule as follows -

**REVIEW OF THE CONTROL OF ADVERTISING SIGNS AND SALE OF GOODS IN PUBLIC PLACES BYLAW 1992; MOBILE OR TRAVELLING SHOPS, HAWKERS, AND ITINERANT TRADERS BYLAW 1991; PUBLIC PLACES BYLAW 2003 AND STREET TRADERS AND BUSKERS BYLAW 2000**

- 1 *This Statement of Proposal is prepared pursuant to sections 83, 86, 89, 155, 158 and 159 of the Local Government Act 2002 (Act).*
- 2 *This is a proposal to revoke the:*
  - a) *Waipa District Mobile or Travelling Shops, Hawkers, and Itinerant Traders Bylaw 1991; and,*
  - b) *Waipa District Control of Advertising Signs and Sale of Goods in Public Places Bylaw 1992; and,*
  - c) *Waipa District Street Traders and Buskers Bylaw 2000; and,*
  - d) *Waipa District Public Place Bylaw 2003.*
- 3 *This is also a proposal to make minor amendments to the Fees and Charges Schedule 2007/2008.*
- 4 *This is also a proposal to make the following bylaws:*
  - a) *Waipa District Public Places Bylaw 2007; and*
  - b) *Waipa District Control of Signs and Sale of Goods in a Public Place Bylaw 2007.*
- 5 *The reason for revoking the existing four bylaws is Council is required to review all bylaws by 1 July 2008.*
- 6 *The reason for proposing to adopt the Waipa District Public Places Bylaw 2007 is to ensure that Council has the necessary power and authority to control activities in public places administered by Council so that any nuisances, health and safety issues and offensive behaviour associated with those activities are minimised.*
- 7 *The reason for proposing to adopt the Waipa District Control of Advertising Signs and Sale of Goods in a Public Places Bylaw 2007 is to ensure that the placing of signs and goods for sale in a public place is undertaken in controlled manner so as to:*
  - a) *Protect the public from nuisance; and,*
  - b) *Protect, promote and maintain public health and safety; and,*

- c) *Minimise the potential for offensive behaviour in public places,*
  - d) *Preserve the visual amenity and character of public places; and,*
  - e) *Minimise any distraction to motorists.*
- 8 *The reason for proposing to amend the Fees and Charges Schedule 2007/2008 is to ensure that the schedule is updated to refer to the activities in the Proposed Public Places Bylaw 2007 instead of the Public Places Bylaw 2003.*

**Review Process**

- 9 *The Council is required to review its existing bylaws by 1 July 2008 pursuant to Section 158 of the Act. The determination to revoke the bylaws referred to in this Statement of Proposal has arisen as a result of that review process.*

*The review under section 158 must take the form of a reconsideration of the matters set out in section 155 of the Act. This section requires the Council to determine whether a bylaw is the most appropriate way of addressing the perceived problem. As a result of the review, the Council considers that the proposed Public Places Bylaw 2007 and proposed Control of Signs and Sale of Goods in a Public Place Bylaw 2007 are the most appropriate way of addressing the perceived problems.*

**Public Notification and Submissions**

*It is proposed to release the draft Waipa District Public Places Bylaw 2007 and Waipa District Control of Signs and Sale of Goods in a Public Place Bylaw 2007 for public comment on 13 July 2007. Submissions must be in writing, and will close at 5 pm on 17 August 2007. Council will acknowledge in writing each submission received. It is proposed that submissions will be heard by Council's Policy Committee at the meeting to be held in Te Awamutu on 10 September 2007 commencing at 9 am. Submitters wishing to be heard in support of their submission must clearly state this in their submission. All submitters wishing to be heard will be given notice of the time.*

## **10 ADMINISTRATION AND ALLOCATION OF COMMUNITY GRANTS – REVIEW OF COUNCIL POLICY**

The Committee was advised that a review of Council policy and delegations on the community grants administered by Community Boards and the Pirongia Ward Consultative Committee has been undertaken because of concerns about the purpose of the grants and inconsistencies in their allocation. Feedback on the issue from both Community Boards was included in the agenda.

The Chairperson said it appears the Community Boards have slightly different interpretations on administration of the grants although both Boards are focussed on community benefit. He said the proposed amendments to the policy would broaden the rules and make them more flexible.

Councillor Barnes asked whether the advertisements, calling for grant applications, should indicate that the policy has changed slightly to prevent smaller groups from going to the effort of making an application. Following discussion it was felt it would not be appropriate for Council to say whether a group is eligible to apply for the funding, or not, and it would work itself out over the course of several funding rounds.

Councillor Taranaki said she was not happy about removing the support to community organisations for day-to-day operations because that is where support is needed. Chairperson Empson said that was the fundamental change being suggested, which is to remove the day to day support, and replace it with support for the general objectives of groups to benefit the wider community.

Councillor Barnes said the smaller organisations would be able to apply to other funding agencies for grants.

Councillor Lee said the review had arisen out of concern that the day to day running costs of small groups should not be the responsibility of ratepayers. He said they should look at amalgamating with other groups to help cover those sorts of costs. Councillor Taranaki said those concerns had not been raised by the community and the current community grants policy has worked well in Cambridge. She said Council might have to accept that the system works differently in Cambridge to Te Awamutu.

Councillor Sharpe said it should be recognised that there is no “wider benefit” in the Pirongia Ward because a grant to a group in Pirongia Village would not benefit Ohaupo.

Mayor Livingston said although the Boards and the Pirongia Ward Consultative Community have allocated grants as they see fit, it has been contrary to Council policy, and amending the criteria would be bringing it into line with Council’s thinking.

## **11 RESERVES CONTRIBUTION EXPENDITURE**

The Policy Committee was reminded that, in April 2005, Council adopted a programme of reserve development work funded from reserves contributions for three years from 2005/06 to 2007/08. Staff were given delegated authority to make minor variations to the work programme so long as they were not inconsistent with its intent. It was explained that the reserve programme presented in the agenda is a continuation of work initiated from the original 2004/05 programme.

The Chief Executive explained what the recommended budgets for the 2007/08 to 2009/10 reserve contribution project expenditure would cover.

Councillor Sharpe asked that the entry for "River Walkways – Pirongia" is amended to show that it relates to Pirongia Ward and not just Pirongia Village.

Councillor Webber asked whether \$10,000 could be allocated to Kakepuku, Maungatautari and Pirongia wards to cover small reserve development jobs in the rural areas. The Chief Executive said the intention of the programme is to keep some of the bigger projects going over a number of years. He said the smaller reserve development work suggested by Councillor Webber could be accommodated within existing work programmes.

In answer to a question from Councillor Barnes, the Chairperson said he understood that the programme of work is a guideline rather than a budget and there is some flexibility available in the overall programme.
