LET'S TALK ABOUT DOGS!

We're proposing to make some changes to where and how dogs can exercise across Waipā and we want to know what you think!

As a dog owner, you'll know that having a dog comes with obligations – to your dog, to your neighbours and to the wider community. Waipā District Council also has obligations, including ensuring the policies and rules we have in place for dogs are fit-for-purpose, keep our community safe and ensure Waipā dogs are well cared for.

On that basis, we're now formally reviewing our Dog Control Policy and related Bylaw around dog control and we're proposing some changes. We'd love your input before decisions are made!

Some things we're proposing include:

- five new exercise areas in Cambridge
- one new exercise area in Te Awamutu/Kihikihi
- two new exercise areas in Maungatautari

We're also proposing changes to...

- areas where dogs can be on-leash and off-leash
- areas where dogs aren't allowed
- · ...and other dog-related issues.

WINTER EXERCISE

Don't let the cooler weather and darker evenings stop you from taking your dog out for a daily jaunt. Dogs appreciate the change of scenery, and the opportunity to sniff out the local smells and to catch up on doggy gossip.

Remember...

- Take a plastic bag to pick up your dog's "doo-doos" – picking up the mess is a legal requirement in any public place.
- Some off leash fun at one of our designated dog exercise areas will burn off that last jolt of energy.
- Keep an eye on your pooch, for their safety as well as other dogs and people.

- If your dog is a little tempted by a game of run-away in an off leash area, get yourself a long light line that your dog can trail so you don't have to go for a run after them.
- Be mindful of other dogs and dog owners. Just like people, your uberfriendly dog might not mesh well with a nervous-type dog. We share these exercise areas.
- When walking the streets during dark winter evenings, consider using a safety glow jacket or collar for your dog that car headlights can pick up from a distance.
- You can also get doggy flashing lights that attach to your dog's collar to help you keep track at offleash parks.
